Opening Letter

Like most of the world, our look back at fiscal year 2020 is dominated by the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on our contracts, customers, programs and participants. Through the uncertainty, anxiety and turmoil we all faced during this time, Team BAC continued to focus on the one thing that drives each of us: our mission.

The challenges of FY20 were beyond anything we could have imagined as a team. However, helping grow the personal success of individuals with disabilities while maintaining the health and safety of our participants, employees and stakeholders remained at the heart of every decision we made this year.

Through the commitment and flexibility of our employees, volunteers, donors, funders and supporters, we realized so many triumphs. Our employees and participants showed a resiliency and spirit that was absolutely inspirational. Nearly 400 essential personnel with significant disabilities continued to serve our federal AbilityOne customers, helping our military and government continue to function. Other teams kept rest areas along I-75 open so Florida's supply chain of goods could continue to flow and our shipments of critical PPE aided organizations across the state. Still others found ways ahead when traditional service provision had to evolve quickly.

We ended the year with a strong financial standing, while we balanced impacts to long term growth on some of our contracts and services. We face a very difficult year ahead. Our traditional funding sources continue to feel the impacts of COVID-19, and our contract and service model continues to face various threats. Our leadership team are well aware of these challenges and are hard at work creating solutions and paths forward for those we serve.

Moving ahead, we will specifically focus on evolving our services, from the way we create work opportunities to the way our training programs operate. We will transition away from the use of the DOL 14c certificate, which previously provided for piece rate work options. We will drive forward even more options for intensive training and support for veterans and individuals with significant disabilities who wish to work and help secure jobs opportunities in high demand industries such as information technology.

Thank you for the part you played in making the stories you'll find in this report possible. We move forward into the coming fiscal year with a renewed commitment to growth of our mission, assisting those with unique abilities in finding their path to personal success.











Services for our team members on these contracts include vocational training, evaluations and assessments, job placement and supports, and benefits planning to assist individuals in maintaining integrated employment and growing their careers.



BAC works diligently to decrease the spread of Covid-19 for Florida travelers

BAC employees working on FDOT contracts enhanced their workload while maintaining rest stops along I-75 and I-4 in Marion, Hillsborough, Pasco, Sumter and Seminole counties. The COVID-19 cleaning and disinfecting protocols put into place ensure travelers a sanitary environment to repose. By keeping the rest areas manned without interruption, the transport of critical PPE supplies throughout Florida remains continuous and provides protection beyond our highways.



New Custodial Services Offered at Hurlburt Field

We launched our new custodial services contract at Hurlburt Field near Pensacola on May 1st and the team hit the ground running while taking on the added responsibilities associated with COVID-19. About 30 new employees will join our existing commissary team already serving our Air Force customer on the base.

BAC's Production Team was recently recognized as the 2020 Employment Center of the Year by RESPECT of Florida, for outstanding performance in the production of commodities which provides employment to Floridians with disabilities.

The award honors excellence in product quality, timely delivery and prompt service. BAC is one of over 100 non-profit agencies within the state of Florida offering employment and training opportunities to persons with significant disabilities, including delivering products and services to local and state government agencies.

Our Production facility focuses on providing intensive training and customized employment options, with the support of our Employment Trainers, for individuals who may not yet have the skills to work in other settings, such as at our AbilityOne contract sites or other community-based jobs.

After the onset of COVID-19, our production team focused largely on delivering critical personal protection equipment to the Florida Department of Health through our RESPECT of Florida contract.

In addition to this incredible honor, Lily Kindred, one of our Adult Day Training participants who also works in Production, was named RESPECT of FL Employee of the Year. This recognition celebrates employment achievement – which is truly the heart of the missions of both RESPECT of Florida and BAC.

Production Facility Provides Critical PPE

The BAC production team ramped up after the onset of COVID-19 to bring on new permanent positions for individuals with significant disabilities to facilitate the need for PPE across the state. Working with RESPECT of Florida, BAC employees were able to provide critical PPE supplies to the Florida Health Department.



Terrance Takes on Tallahassee!

Team BAC traveled to the Florida Capitol in February to share stories and seek funding support for critical services from our Delegation. Terrance Edgecombe was our self-advocate. He was joined by his sister and guardian Angel, and staff members Amar Patel and Susan McGrath. The team met with nine legislators over two days.

For Terrance, BAC has helped him grow his skills and follow his interests. He most enjoys working in Production, doing work that fits his unique skill set. Angel shared that Terrance's participation with BAC has been critical to her. "I work full time. Knowing Terrance is safe and being productive at BAC means I



can keep my job, which I obviously have to do as head of our household," she said.

Our team asked for support to fund our training programs. Senator Wright and Representative Plasencia sponsored the ask and Terrance worked hard to seek buy-in from each of the other representatives.

"Self-advocacy is the most critical way we can illustrate the importance of BAC programs," said Patel, BAC President & CEO. "When our elected officials spend time talking with our participants, they have a better understanding of just how critical programs like ours are. They are even more inspired to fight for the funding we need."

In June, we learned Terrance's hard work paid off. Amid significant budget impacts due to COVID-19, our request was fully funded, providing \$199,714 in critical employment training services!

VA Hospital looks to BAC to keep up with COVID-19 Needs

BAC employees working to keep up with the housekeeping needs for our customer, the VA Hospital, found themselves serving as front line workers to help stop the spread of COVID-19. Additional services and protocols were put into place to keep all staff, employees, and patients safe throughout the pandemic.



Cloth Face Covers to the Rescue

Members of the ADT staff made over 1,000 face coverings for our employees to use as part of our COVID-19 precautions. We were able to also share with two other non-profits in the Brevard area: Brevard Family Partnership and Candlelighters of Brevard to help keep their participants, staff and volunteers safe.



Tiger Coin Program Lunched!

In the spirit of the military's "Commander's Coin" and the "Tiger Team" concept that NASA made famous, BAC launched the Tiger Challenge Coin recognition program. The tiger represents inner strength and courage; it has been used for years by the military and NASA as a symbol of excellence or high performance. "Tiger Teams" are small groups of specialized, cross-functional employees brought together to solve a specific problem or critical issue. NASA's most famous Tiger Team was deployed during the Apollo 13 mission in 1970.

Through this program, BAC will honor employees or teams of employees who display excellence in their work, support of our core values, or commitment to solving a critical issue or challenge in a new, creative, more effective way. Each coin will be awarded "on-the-spot," based on merit and achievement as determined by our mangers and will be followed by a bonus.



Essential Personnel and Virtual Programs Keep BAC Services Strong During COVID

Our Adult Day Training, Industry Readiness Training, BAC Arts, Practical Application of Career Exploration and our Summer Camps all quickly moved to providing virtual content once in-person options were closed because of COVID-19. We have received a lot of positive feedback from participants, caregivers, teachers and community members, including viewers from Europe!

In late August our Adult Day Training Program welcomed back two phases of participants to in-person programming, growing participation to 32 people since COVID forced its closure in March.

Not only are returning participants focusing on building life skills and other empowerment classes, they also are focusing on building employability skills, taking part in virtual job shadow experiences and growing the many soft skills all employees need.




